What is Functional Language?

Functional language is the language you need to use in specific situations. For example, when you say, **Hello! How are you?** you are greeting. In other words, the function here is Greeting and the language you need for that is **Hello! How are you?**

Here is another example, **Hi, I am Michael.** The function here is Introducing yourself and the language you need for that is **Hi, I am Michael.**

Some other examples of functions and the language (fixed expressions or exponents) that could be used are:

- Asking for advice
- Giving advice
- Explaining (rules)
- Apologising
- Agreeing / Disagreeing
- What should I do?
- I think you should...
- You are not allowed to...
- I'm deeply sorry about...
- I am not sure that's correct!

Remember:

- There are several fixed expressions or exponents that can be used with different functions.
- The more functional language you know, the better your interacting skills will get.
- Formality is important; some expressions can be used with friends but not with teachers or parents.
- Learning Vocabulary helps you say more, learning Grammar helps you say things correctly and learning Functional language helps you adapt your English to the situation you are in – real-life communication.

A simple way to describe **functions** is:

What you can actually do with the language!
