# Verbs (Regular & Irregular)



Think about some verbs you can use when you are talking about LANGUAGE.

**Description** 

WILL	SHALL		
1. It can be used for things which are expected happen.  E.g. He'll call you tomorrow.	1. Shall is always used in the 1 <sup>st</sup> person (I or we) in the question  E.g. Shall I leave the door open?  E.g. Shall we have lunch now?		
2. It can be used as conditional with if.			
E.g. Jo will give you a gift if you come to the party.			
3. We use will or shall requests and offers.  E.g. Will you help me choosing the new decoration?	2. Shall is sometimes used modern English with the 1 <sup>st</sup> person (I or we) when we are speaking or writing formally.  E.g. We shall never forget your kindness.		
<ul> <li>4. When will is stressed, it often means someone insists on persists in doing something.</li> <li>E.g. Pat will keep playing football until the end of the season.</li> </ul>	*Remember that most of the time we use shall for questions.*		

EXTRA NOTES: will = 'll shall = 'll
S + shall/will + frequency adverb + verb infinitive + complement
frequency adverb (always, never, sometimes, etc)

**Description** 



Shall and will are both modal verbs and used with main verbs to elaborate the function of main verbs. Both have similar meaning but are used in different grammatical contexts. Shall is used with first person and will is used with second and third person. In modern English, will is OK 99.9% cases. Even in formal writing will is acceptable for first person. But if you want to be very formal, then you should write shall with first person. Remember, in emphatic cases, promise or command, shall is still used equally and do not forget to reverse the use of will and shall in emphatic expressions: promise and command.

\*Remember that most of the time we use shall for questions.\*

### How can we use WILL or SHALL?


I'm hungry. I \_\_\_\_\_ make some eggs with ham.
 I hope I \_\_\_\_\_ see you again soon.
 we go to the movies tonight?
 I don't think I \_\_\_\_\_ visit my friends this weekend, I'm very tired.
 I \_\_\_\_\_ always take care of you.
 It's very cold in this room, \_\_\_\_\_ I turn off the fan?
 I forgot to call Mary, I \_\_\_\_\_ do it now.

I'm sure I find a great job.

#### **EXTRA NOTES:**

- Remember that most of the time we use **SHALL** for questions.
- We use <u>SHALL</u> or <u>WILL</u> when we offer to do things for other people [Shall I? / Will I?]
- We use SHALL to suggest doing something. [Shall I? Shall we?]
- It's common to use <u>WILL</u> with Think, Hope, Sure, Perhaps, etc.
- We use **WILL** for promises.
- We use **WILL** when we make decisions at the moment.
- We use <u>WILL</u> to talk about things that we think will happen in the future.

Future WILL & SHALL (SUMMARY)



Shall and will are both modal verbs and used with main verbs to elaborate the function of main verbs. Both have similar meaning but are used in different grammatical contexts. Shall is used with first person and will is used with second and third person. In modern English, will is OK 99.9% cases. Even in formal writing will is acceptable for first person. But if you want to be very formal, then you should write shall with first person. #### FUTURE WILL & SHALL

#### [AFFIRMATIVE]

S + will / shall + verb infinitive + C

[NEGATIVE]

S + will / shall + not + verb infinitive + C

will not = won't shall not = shan't [INTERROGATIVE]

Will / Shall + S + verb infinitive + C ?

#### WILL SHALL

1. It can be used for things which are expected to happen.

E.g. He'll call you tomorrow.

- 2. It can be used as a conditional with if.
  E.g. Jo will give you a gift if you come to the party.
- **3.** We use will or shall for requests and offers. E.g. Will you help me choosing the new decoration?

1. Shall is always used in the 1st person (I or we) in the question form.

E.g. **Shall** I **leave** the door open? E.g. **Shall** we **have** lunch now?

2. Shall is sometimes used in modern English with the 1<sup>st</sup> person (I or we) when we are speaking or writing formally.

E.g. We **shall never forget** your kindness.

\*Remember that most of the time we use shall for questions.\*
