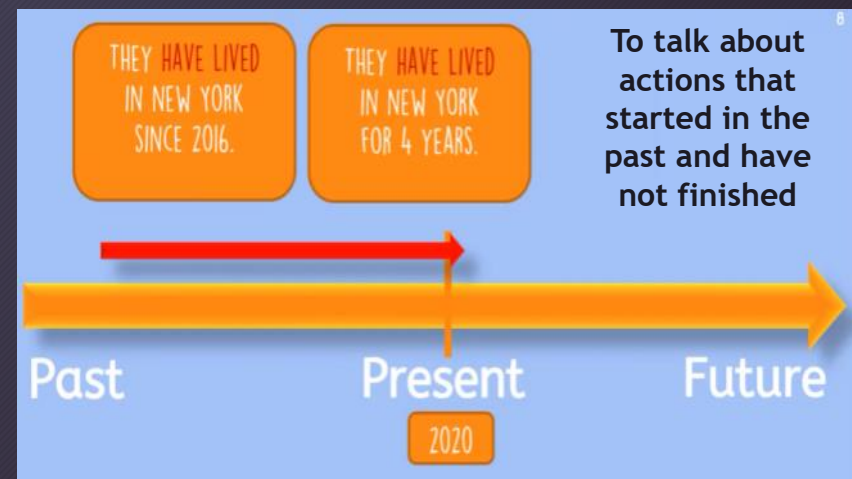
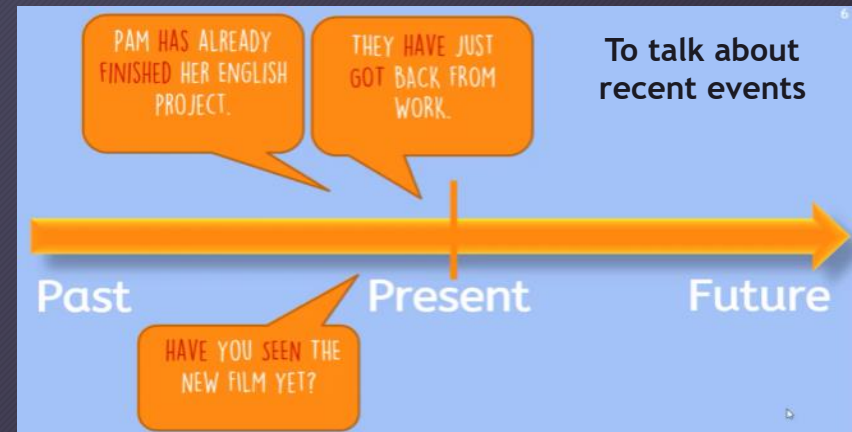
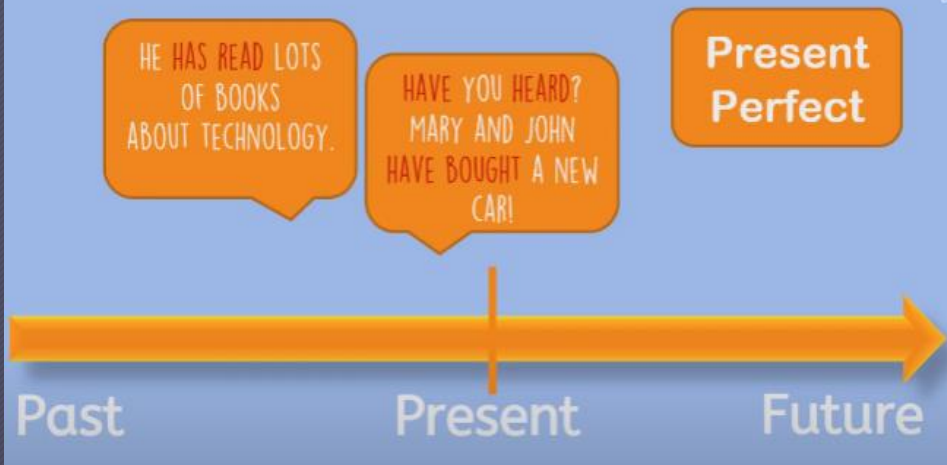

Description

We can use the Present Perfect Simple:

To talk about things that happened in the past at some time before the present moment, but we don't know when they happen.



Present Perfect Simple

Affirmative
(+)

Description

We can use the Present Perfect Simple:

With **YET** to talk about actions which haven't happened up to now or to ask someone if they have done sth at some point up to the present moment.

I haven't seen that film yet.

Form:

hasn't/haven't + past
participle + **yet**.

With **YET** to ask someone if they have done sth at some point up to the present moment.

Have you finished your homework yet?

Form:

Has/Have + subject + past
participle + **yet**.

With **ALREADY** to talk about actions which have happened before now.

I've already seen that film.

Form:

has/have + **already** + past
participle.

With **JUST** to talk about something you did a short time ago.

I've just had the exam results!

Form:

has/have + **just** + past participle.

Present Perfect Simple

Affirmative
(+)

Description

We can use the Present Perfect Simple:

With **ever** and **never** to talk about events and experiences at any time in the past when we don't specify the time.

With **SINCE** and **FOR** when we talk about situations that started at a point of time in the past and still continue.

Have you ever eaten snails?
Jack has never seen a whale.

We use – **since** with a point in time and
– **for** with a period of time.

Jane has lived in Italy since 2010.
Jane has lived in Italy for 10 years.
