Description

Zero Conditional

- *Use it for facts that are generally true and don't change.
- *It refers to a general situation that always happens if a conditional is met.
- *The condition always has the same result.

E.g.:

If you leave chocolate in the sun, it melts.

If Condition, + Result
Result + if Condition

Zero Conditional

Affirmative
(+)
Negative (-)
Interrogative
(?)

Description

Conditional 0

[AFFIRMATIVE]

If + S + **present simple** , + C +
S + **present simple** + C

E.g. If I put water on the stove,
it boils.

[NEGATIVE]

If + S + **present simple** , +
S + **does / do + not** +
verb infinitive + C

If + S + **does / do + not** , +
S + **does / do + not** +
verb infinitive + C

E.g. If I **don't** put the ice in the
freezer, it **doesn't** freeze.

[INTERROGATIVE]

If + S + **present simple** ,
Do / Does + S + verb infinitive
+ C ?

If I **don't** bring my umbrella,
do I get wet?

NOTE: When the sentence starts with IF, use a comma to separate the 2 ideas, when IF is in the middle of the sentence, you don't use a comma.

E.g. **If** I leave chocolate in the sun, it melts. / Chocolate melts **if** I leave it in the sun.



Zero Conditional

- *Use it for facts that are generally true and don't change.
