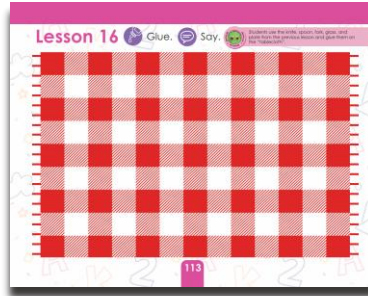


Awesome Kidz 2

Unit 4 Lesson 16



Aim: Students will practice naming and placing tableware items (fork, knife, spoon, glass, plate) by gluing them onto a tablecloth image, reinforcing vocabulary, spatial awareness, and real-life routines through hands-on play.

Time: 45-60 minutes

Materials:

- Cut-out tableware from Lesson 15 (fork, knife, spoon, plate, glass)
- Glue sticks
- Real or toy table setting as reference
- Labels with object names (optional)
- Soft background music (e.g., mealtime sounds or classical instrumental)

Tip: Invite children to participate in a calm, rhythmic setup process. This slows down the experience and encourages focus and care—important in Waldorf and Montessori practices. This is a great time to observe children’s independence and social interaction. Use gentle guidance, but allow space for creative thinking and mistakes. Praise effort more than perfection.

Engage:

Let’s Set the Table Together

-Bring a basket with real tableware and a fabric tablecloth. Set it up with the class. Say each item’s name clearly: “This is a fork.” Ask children: “Where does the fork go?”, “What do we use the spoon for?”

-Let children help place the real objects on the table.

Explore & Practice:

With the Book

Gluing the Tableware

-Distribute books. Students take their cut-out items from Lesson 15 and glue them onto the tablecloth in their proper place. Say and repeat while placing: “The fork goes on the left.”, “The knife goes on the right.”

-Allow flexibility for exploration, but model correct placement using real objects or a demo mat.

Peer Teaching

-In pairs or small groups, students show their tablecloth and say: “This is my plate.”, “This is the spoon.”

-Peers can ask: “Where is your glass?” or “Is this the knife?”

Closing:

Picnic Play Role Play

-Turn the classroom into a pretend picnic area with music and soft lighting or if possible, take the children to the playground. Students sit with their glued tablecloths and "serve" each other imaginary food using gestures and English phrases like: "Do you want some pizza?"

Encourage gratitude and manners: "Thank you," "You're welcome."

Optional Goodbye Song (to the tune of "Row, Row, Row Your Boat"):

Set, set, set the table,

Everything in place.

Fork and knife and spoon and glass,

With a happy face!
