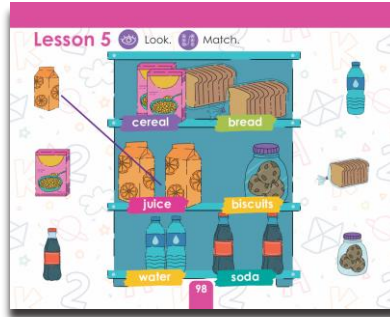


Awesome Kidz 2

Unit 4 Lesson 5



Aim: Students will recognize and name common grocery items in English (cereal, juice, biscuits, bread, water, soda), develop visual matching skills, and improve their vocabulary through observation and discussion.

Time: 45-60 minutes

Materials:

- Real or toy versions of the food items (optional)
- Word and picture flashcards of the target vocabulary
- Shelves, baskets, or boxes for sorting games
- Glue sticks and crayons
- Shelves outlines for drawing activity *attached
- Music for transitions or clean-up

Tip: Integrate real-life context by linking the shelf activity to children's home experiences—ask them what they have on their kitchen shelves. Let them touch and explore the real objects before matching images.

Engage:

Activity: What's in Your Kitchen?

- Show real items or toy versions (a juice box, a loaf of bread, etc.). Place them on a low shelf or table. Let children guess and name each item. Ask: "Who has juice at home?" "What do you eat for breakfast?" Use full sentences and encourage responses like: "I drink juice."

Explore & Practice:

With the book

- Hand out the book page and help students look carefully at each shelf. Guide them in matching the items from the side of the page to the correct shelf. Use verbal cues like: "Where is the cereal? Let's find the same picture."
- Encourage independent matching, but offer visual and verbal support.

Grocery Shelf Sorting Game

- Set up small boxes or baskets as shelves. Give children flashcards or toy items (e.g., bottles, boxes, cookies). Let them sort the objects into the correct shelves by type (drink, breakfast food, snack). Ask: "Is this a drink or food?" "Where does it go?"

Closing:

Draw Your Favourite Shelf

- Each child draws 2 or 3 things they'd like to keep on their shelf at home. In a circle, invite them to say. "On my shelf, I have juice and bread." Stick their drawings on a classroom "grocery shelf" display.

Optional Song:

*“On the shelf, I see some bread,
Juice and biscuits, just like you said!
Water bottles, cereal too,
I match them all – now how about you?”*
