Unit 6 Lesson 1



Aim: - Vocabulary focus: pet animals (bird, cat, dog, fish) Skills: Listening, pointing, and speaking

Time: 45-60 minutes

Materials:

- Flashcards of each animal (bird, cat, dog, fish)
- Small plush toys or figurines of the pets (if available)
- Paper, crayons, and child-safe scissors for drawing and cutting
- AK audio track

Tip: Repetition and movement (pointing, matching, drawing) help young learners remember new words. Encourage their confidence by praising their efforts and creativity.

Engage:

-Start by showing the class a plush toy or a figurine of each pet and ask them, "What animal is this?" Encourage responses like "It's a dog!" to activate prior knowledge.

Story Time

-Tell a short, simple story involving the pets on the page. For example, "One day, a dog, cat, bird, and fish decided to go on an adventure in the garden..." Use gestures and a playful tone to grab their attention and make them curious about the lesson. Engage their imagination by giving the pets funny names and personalities.

Explore & Practice:

With the book

- Show each animal on the page and play the audio track. Ask the children to listen carefully.
- Have the children repeat after they listen, emphasizing clear pronunciation. Say, "This is a bird. Can you say bird?"

Pointing Game

- Hold up the flashcards one by one and ask the children to find the matching pet on the page. Say, "Where is the dog? Can you point to the dog?"
- Afterward, mix the flashcards and encourage them to match each flashcard with the pet on the page.

Animal Sorting

- If you have plush toys or figurines, place them in a basket. Have the children take turns picking a pet and placing it in front of the matching picture on the page.

Art Activity

- Provide paper and crayons for the children to draw their favorite pet from the page. Once they're done, let them cut out their drawings with child-safe scissors.

- Afterward, they can show their drawing to the class and say, "This is my cat" (or the chosen pet).

Closing:

Pet Sound Gam

- Say each pet's name and ask the children what sound it makes (e.g., "What sound does a dog make?"). Encourage them to make the animal sounds together for a playful and interactive ending.

Review & Goodbye

- Show each pet one more time and ask the children to say the name of each animal together. This reinforces vocabulary and builds confidence.

- End the lesson with a simple song or rhyme about pets to wrap up the theme.
