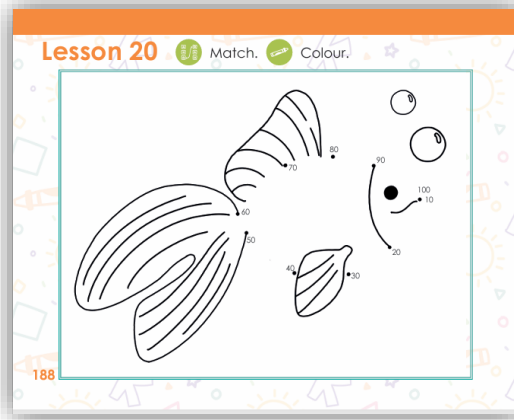


Awesome Kidz 3

Unit 6 Lesson 20



Aim: Students will practice recognizing numbers and letters in sequence by connecting dots to form an image. They will also develop fine motor skills by coloring the image.

Time: 45-60 minutes

Materials:

- Crayons or coloured pencils for colouring
- Optional: Large printed number and letter charts for visual reference
- Optional: Small reward stickers for completing the activity

Tip: Encourage Patience and Precision: Connecting dots can be challenging for little ones. Remind them to go slowly and double-check that they're following the right sequence. Gentle encouragement will help them feel more confident.

Engage:

- Begin with a short warm-up activity to review numbers and letters. Sing a counting song up to 100 and go through the alphabet. Show a large chart of numbers and letters, inviting students to identify a few of each.

Explore & Practice:

With the book

- Introduce the book page and explain that by connecting the dots in the right order, they'll reveal a surprise picture. Guide them to start at number 10 and continue connecting to each successive number (10, 20, 30...) and letter (a, b, c...) until the image is complete.
- Walk around to support students in recognizing the correct sequence and assist them if they need help following the order.
- Connecting the dots reinforces number and letter order while developing hand-eye coordination and concentration.

Colouring the Picture

- Once the dots are connected and the picture is revealed, encourage students to colour it using crayons or coloured pencils. Let them choose colours creatively or guide them with suggestions based on the completed image.

Closing:

Show and Share

- Once they have completed their picture, gather the students to share their work. Each child can show their completed picture to the class and describe the colours they used or what they enjoyed most about connecting the dots.
- This activity fosters social interaction, listening, and speaking skills in a supportive environment. Sharing reinforces pride in their work, enhances communication skills, and builds a sense of community in the classroom.
